Dr. David T. Uehling was born and raised outside of Chicago. He completed his urology training at Northwestern and a fellowship at Chicago Children's Memorial Hospital. In 1965, he joined the staff at the University of Wisconsin. Clinically, Dr. Uehling developed a statewide practice in pediatric urology and served the children of Wisconsin for 40 years. From a research perspective, Dr. Uehling distinguished himself with continuous NIH funding in the treatment of urinary tract infections.

Dr. Uehling assumed the chair of the urology division at the UW in 1983 and grew the program into one of national standing. Since stepping down as chairman in 2001, Dr. Uehling has continued to serve the Department of Urology as an Emeritus Professor. He has impacted the lives of many patients, urologists, and scientists throughout the world. This meeting was established in his honor as a way to emphasize his great accomplishments.

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
