

## **Notable and Newsworthy**

Will Ricke, PhD recently had his article titled, "RNA-binding-protein DDX3 mediates post-transcriptional regulation of androgen receptor: a mechanism of castration-resistance" published in Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

At the recent (virtual) annual CAIRIBU (Collaborating for the Advancement of Interdisciplinary Research in Benign Urology) meeting, the UW SMPH DOU was well-represented, earning the most awards of any other institution within CAIRIBU.

- Matthew Grimes, MD, won "best poster" award for his work, "Decreased CD44 expression is associated with increased hyaluronic and acid abundance in human lichen sclerosis."
- In a tie for "best poster" in the "prostate and aging" category, Teresa Liu, PhD and Livianna Myklebust, BS (mentored by Will Ricke, PhD) were awarded "best posters."
  Both are investigators within the UW-Madison George M. O'Brien (U54) Urology Center.

We are also pleased to recognize our new faculty members that will be joining us next year. Joining our Pediatric Urology faculty will be Dr. Shannon Cannon, who will have completed her fellowship at Seattle Children's Hospital, as well as Dr. Vinaya Bhatia, who will have completed her fellowship at Texas Children's Hospital. We will also be welcoming Dr. Daniel Shapiro to our Urology faculty after completing his two-year Urologic Oncology fellowship at University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center.

These are just a few high points of the year. All of our dedicated faculty and staff have made contributions to our success that are too numerous to list here. Suffice it to say, we appreciate everyone's efforts. The external support from our friends and partners is key to achieving this level of success.
